Stereotypes

Young people in Canada need more information and opportunities to discuss cultural & global issues. Newcomer youth are frequently asked inappropriate questions which are based on stereotypes. Many of these misconceptions are spread by the media.

"Someone asked me if we rode to school on elephants in India"

"Do you have food in Africa?"

"Why did your last name change? Are you a child bride?"

"My mother's friend was told that she didn't get a job because her clothes smelled."

Xenophobia

Fear and hatred of strangers or foreigners or of anything that is strange or foreign. ¹

Newcomer youth and children face discrimination by their peers in school and in their neighborhoods. They can be bullied because of differences. Often they are made fun of because of food, clothes, accents, colour of their skin, cultural values, choice of style and country of origin. This can take the form of name-calling and even start physical confrontations.
